In the weeks before the wedding, various rituals are performed to prepare the couple for marriage. The bride undergoes "kutokota," where elder women provide marital guidance, while the groom receives counsel from elder men. Rehearsals and final arrangements for the ceremony also take place.

The wedding day, or "kupelafela," is a grand celebration involving the entire community. Held at the bride's home, traditional rituals bless the couple. They exchange vows and receive blessings from family and friends, with traditional music, dance, and feasting symbolizing joy and unity.

After the wedding, post-wedding rituals, known as "ku belwa," are conducted. The bride and groom visit each other's families, solidifying the bond between them. These visits include feasting and gifts, reinforcing the new alliance.
